maintain a 24/7 365 watch over
commercial shipping, fishing and
leisure activities within Port controlled
waters. We are the voice of Portland
Harbour Radio on VHF Ch 74, we
control shipping movements,
communicate with shipping agents,
drive the Pilot Boats to get our Pilots



on and off ships. The safety of all is our priority. Growing up in Weymouth & Portland nurtured my passion for the sea. I sail, surf, SUP, snorkel and swim. With a dear friend I rowed an ocean rowing boat across the Atlantic from Tenerife to Barbados. We rowed naked – but that's another story! My sea time and experiences gave me the foundation to study for, and achieve, the commercial qualifications I required for this job. The sea and marine environment are a fantastic teacher. Every day is a school day and that makes me happy!

YOUR QUESTIONS

Q: WHAT'S BEEN GOING ON IN NEWTONS COVE UPDATE

A: You might have noticed lots of workboat activity going on in Newtons Cove. This was the works to install a new sea water intake pipe to the CEFAS pumping station. At the end of this pipe there is a new intake structure a few meters from the existing one. As they are spaced apart the Harbour Authority & Trinity House decided that each structure should be marked with fixed Special Mark and the original buoy has been removed.

NETS AGAIN, PROPOSED RULE CHANGES, HM DIRECTION

I think this is about the fourth time I have mentioned the inappropriate use of nets and pots on the Hamm beach. Sadly, I must report that we have had another two incidents where windsurfers from our British Olympic Training Squad have hit floating pot ropes. One windsurfer was injured and needed medical attention; damage was also done to their equipment.

The ignoring of the rules by fishermen have forced the Harbour Authority into a position where we now have to review the use of Fishing Equipment in this area. The Harbour Consultative Committee will now be consulted on our proposed changes to the rules on fishing.

<u>VISITORS: VISIT FROM SAILING VESSEL 'GOOD DOG' ON HIS HARBOUR MASTERS</u> CHALLENGE (MARK ASHLEY-MILLER)

I am raising money for The Seafarers' Charity (formerly King George's Fund for Sailors) by sailing around the whole Great Britain & Ireland, attempting to visit every harbour with a

Harbour Master between 2019 and 2024. Starting in Dartmouth in March 2019, I reached Oban having met 78 Harbour Masters and in 2020 I sailed over the top of Scotland where I met another 32 HMs. 2021 saw me sailing down the east coast to London putting another 75 in the bag. 2022's passage is along the south coast, including the Channel Islands, before returning to Dartmouth. In 2023 I tackle Ireland.

I interview each Harbour Master and record information about their harbour and their varied job and posting it on Instagram

(@harbourmastersailingchallenge) as I sail along. I attempt to sail into each

harbour - but where that is not possible, I visit the Harbour Master on foot.



I am supporting The Seafarers' Charity in memory of my father Peter, who was in the Royal Navy. They also support men's mental health having suffered depression myself, and which I am keen to promote.

The Seafarers' Charity has been helping people in the maritime community for over 100 years, by providing practical support to seafarers in need and to their families. They also support those in education or training who are preparing to work or serve at sea. The charity does this by giving grants to organisations and projects that make a real difference to people's lives, across the Merchant Navy, Fishing Fleets, Royal Navy, and Royal Marines. Last year, Seafarers UK gave grants totaling £2.5 million to 50 maritime welfare charities. Seafarers' receives no government funding and is heavily dependent on public donations and legacies to maintain its grant-making programme.

10% of what I raise is being donated to St Martin's Church, Lillington, Sherborne, Dorset. I am Church Warden of this beautiful and thriving church, and in return for being released from my wardening duty for my 5-year Odyssey, Seafarers' has kindly agreed to share part of what I raise.



Q. The Port has been supplied with intermediate Seagrass Zone Marker Buoys denoting the protected no anchoring area near Castle Cove Beach.
